Mid-Year Update: As part of our mid-year reporting process we also review how we are tracking as a school towards our end of year goals. I can share that our results in Reading, Writing and Maths are tracking along positively and I was able to share these at our most recent Board of Trustees meeting. Our end of year goal is to have 90% of students achieving At or Above the National Standard in Reading, Writing and Maths.

The work we are doing in our Community of Learning is also progressing well as we continue to work collaboratively with the 8 other Primary Schools and 3 High Schools in our CoL. This has ensured initiatives, ideas and best practice can be shared between Primary Schools and High Schools for the benefit of the over 4000 students in our Community of Learning.



Wig Wednesday: The Wig Wednesday fundraiser this year achieved the outstanding result of raising a total of \$3370 for Child Cancer. What an awesome response from our community getting in behind this really special fundraiser. Growth Mindset: At school this year we have been

focussing on encouraging children to have a growth mindset and encouraging them to be positive when they find things hard. When children get stuck on a problem it is a good thing because it means they are about to learn something. An important word to use that encourages a growth mindset is "yet". A child saying, they can't do something or they're not good at something when followed by the word "yet" changes their whole perspective. It helps them recognise that while they can't presently do the activity they will be able to do it in the future after some hard work and new learning. I encourage you to add the word "yet" when you are discussing learning that is hard at home and see how this changes your child's attitude towards the new challenge.

Year 5 & 6 EFS visit to Plant HB Nursery

Last Friday our students visited Plant HB, the largest growers of native plants in Hawkes Bay. Many thanks to Marie Taylor and her team for being such wonderful hosts, organising a quiz and potting up activities for us. The children were each given a rare kakabeak plant, grown from seeds collected at Shine Falls, to take home.

The pupils also helped pot up Muehlenbeckia ephedroides, an unusual, leafless variety only found in a few places in Hawkes Bay.



The groups were challenged to collect as many weeds as they could...great effort!

Next term the pupils from Ruru, Kokako and Korimako will be working in our hands – on outdoor areas at school. We require adult assistance for these sessions, keep an eye out for the roster early next term.

We enjoyed various energising activities throughout and then after lunch our Enviro Squad pupils led tours of the school. This was very empowering for our students with all visiting schools very impressed.


Eskdale Park Planting
