Welcome to the July newsletter, the final one for what has been a really busy and successful term across a variety of learning activities and experiences. Thank you all for your support in making this term a great one for our students. I want to acknowledge the hard work of our teaching team who have provided a real variety of opportunities for our students and the students have certainly made the most of their opportunities.

**Grandparents Day:** We had our first ever grandparent's day on Tuesday. What an awesome turnout of grandparents! Our best estimate based on the number of cups of tea served was that there were around 250 grandparents at school. The students loved the opportunity to share their school with their grandparents and I know from talking to the grandparents they thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to spend some time at Eskdale School. For some it was a return to their old primary school. Grandparents play an integral part in our student's lives and with the success of the day I am sure this may well become an annual event.

**Report Survey:** Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the Report survey. We look forward to using the results as a guide when we design our new reporting format.

**Edible Fashion Awards:** The Edible Fashion Awards is a show that any one of any age can enter. Each year there is a different theme. This year it was peace, love and diversity. The designs had to somehow represent or fit in with the theme but also had to have something to do with food.

A lady from edible fashion awards came and talked to us about the event and encouraged us to be creative with our entries in the competition.

We had six weeks to organise and create our designs. We could be in a group of two or work by ourselves. Everyone had to overcome challenges and persevere along the way. Over 80 costumes were entered in the intermediate category and 57 of the designs were from Kuaka Class.



We took a bus to the pre judging show. None of the costumes that were anything alike. When it was



our turn to be judged (Intermediated Section) we walked on the catwalk and the judges asked us questions about our design. Then came the exciting bit. Finding out who the finalists were. 16 designs from the intermediate category were chosen and 4 of them where from Eskdale School. We all went to the final judging event which was on the Saturday night. It was very exciting and nerve racking. I was lucky enough to be the winner for the intermediate category.

Kids Lit Quiz: The lit quiz is an international quiz about books, there are lots of heats in each country. There is then a national final and a world final. You can enter two teams from each school. We started training in term 1 for the Hawkes Bay heat. The way we trained was we got given questions and the first team to press the squeaky thing got to answer. We trained once a week for a while until we got to the Napier heats. There what happened was that you had a sheet of paper and the quizmaster asked questions. You wrote

down what you thought the answer was. There was ten rounds of ten questions and you got to pick one round in which to get double points. Our team won the Hawkes Bay competition and the other team came 5<sup>th</sup>. That meant we got to go to the national finals. Our training went from one day a week to five mornings a week. We finally go to the National final in Wellington. There instead of paper to write your answers you had to use buzzers. The questions were read aloud and a team could buzz in at any time. If you were right you would get the points and if you were wrong you would lose points and the chance to answer that question again. We came third equal and then took out 3<sup>rd</sup> place outright by winning the sudden death final question. Our prize was \$75 cash each. 
It was the second straight year Eskdale School has provided a winning story after Tiaki McArdle's An Eggcellent Adventure in 2017.

#### Wanted -flat stones for Art Classes Next Term





#### Waste Audit 2018

Every year our school conducts a waste audit in Term 2. All the waste from that day is collected, sorted and weighed and we use this information to measure how well our practices are working and to re-evaluate what we can be doing better to reduce our impact on the landfill. This year we conducted our Waste Audit on June 11<sup>th</sup> as part of a Hawkes Bay wide initiative by the Youth Environment Council. Many thanks to the Enviro Squad members who helped with this again this year.







Foil packets make up a large proportion of our total waste. These do not break down in the landfill. Have you thought about buying larger packets and filling a reusable plastic container in the lunchbox instead?

Food scraps are sorted, and processed through one of our organic methods. The by-products of this, either compost or worm tea, is then used on our school gardens.

Our Enviro Squad continue to work on our waste issues and are currently consulting with staff to try to solve some of the issues and reduce the school's impact on the landfill.






#### **AWATOTO FOOTGOLF**

#### POSSUM CONTROL

#### To Parents and Caregivers

Rural Pest Services Ltd. will be laying poisons for possum control between April 2018 through to September 2018 in the following area, pending appropriate approval and suitable weather conditions.

Project areas cover the following DOC reserves:

Hatuma Conservation Area 100.7ha's Central Hawke's Bay Huranui Scenic Reserves 27ha's Central Hawke's Bay. Mclean's Bush Scenic Reserve 28ha's Central Hawke's Bay. Elsthorpe Scenic Reserves 35ha's Central Hawke's Bay. Tangoio Falls Scenic Reserve 46ha's Tangoio.

Warning notices will be placed on all normal accesses points.

Poison areas will remain toxic till all warning notices are removed.

#### POISONS TO BE USED

> <u>CYANIDE</u> pellets, (Feratox) (2-5 pellets, each about 4mm round coloured green) will be put in KK bait stations or bait bag and applied to trees.

Parents please make sure children do not have access to these areas.

If they need to go to these areas that they are under strict adult supervision at all times.

Because of risk of poisoning from baits and carcasses please keep dogs and other animals under strict control and do not allow animals to wander into or near these areas
