
Coastal Cluster Lit Quiz:



Hawkes Bay Year 7 Mathletics: Last week we had three teams compete in the Hawkes Bay Year 8 Mathletics competition. Each night over thirty teams, ninety of the best Maths brains in Hawkes Bay competed in the events and all of our teams did the school proud! In the year 7 competition Tess, Leah and Tia got a Bronze award, and Jayden, Josiah and Ethan got a silver award. In the year 8 competition Fraser, Liam and Daniel O got a silver award, and Harris, Nicole and Caspian got a Gold award and in doing so took out overall third place in this very challenging event.



Top Spot Writing Competition: Students from Kereru class entered the annual Top Spot writing competition run by The Walking Access Commission. They received over 300 entries and Ruby Kaye and Rhea Chantrey made it to the final with Rhea taking out 2nd place in the poem/story writing division. Congratulations to Rhea on this achievement, she received her prize today. Below is her piece of writing.

ERO Visit: Next term in week three we welcome an Education Review Office team headed up by Ruth Nicholas. I look forward to sharing what we are doing at Eskdale School with the team.

Year 5 and 6 Camp: The three year 5/6 classes went away on camp last week. I know they all had a blast. It was nice to hear from the Camp Manager just how well our kids behaved and the way they took on the challenges with a smile on their face. Below is some writing from Hihi students about their experiences on camp.

'During camp we did pioneering. Pioneering is when you tie knots and build things using the different type of knots you learn. The first knot we learnt is called a Reef knot. The first step to make a Reef knot is left over right and under and then right over left and under. The second knot was called the Clove hitch with this one you make an X shape and then lift it up and put a tail under. The third knot



was called the lashing. The first step is to make a clove hitch and then you rap the rope around all the different diagonal and straight ways. After we learnt all those knots we got to make two tepees on each side of a small river and then we put a branch on the bottom of the tepees and try to walk over it.' By Jamie.

'During camp we did archery up on top of the hills. The guy running it was called Toren, first we got a safety talk about the bow and arrows then we split into little groups and lined up behind a picnic table. The first people were Tom and Mayah. Tom got his arrow on the target and Mayah didn't do

as well. After a couple shots we played a game. The game was a competition and my team won. After the game we went over to the pistol range, a couple of people shot the guns well. Toren talked to us about the guns. We got back into our archery groups I went first I cocked the hammer and then fired, **bang** I hit a tin at the end of the firing range. It felt *really* good. I got another 9 shots and in the end I hit 4 tins and 1 target. Everyone else got a turn then the bus came and we had to go. We had a fun time.' By Leon

'The Mud run was a fun adventure for Hihi and Karearea's six teams. We all participated and completed the obstacles together. It was basically a huge fun run including a lake that we had to climb over using two wire cables one above and below. We had to run through streams and mini ravines with wire above them and help each other through muddy bogs and puddles. Each team got timed and left one minute after another. I thought the rules were well thought out, one of the examples were when another team passes you, you have to stop and let them pass. Team four's time was thirty-one minutes and forty seconds,

'On the year 5&6 camp one of the activities was white-water rafting. First we got told the rules. Then they put the rafts in the river it was the Mohaka river. We learnt that Mohaka means dancing boulders and that it is the second largest river in New Zealand. We rode the rafts and there was only rapid levels 1&2 so it was safe. It took five hours and five minutes. We did a race from one side of the river to the other and back. After about 20 minutes we went to the restaurant to have lunch and played the paddle game. That's where everyone has a paddle and someone calls left or right and they jump to the left or to the right. Then we went back in the water and got to stand up in

Board of Trustees Update

From the Board of Trustees meeting on 25 September 2018

Since the last meeting of the Board in late July, the Board has worked through the required process to fill a Parent Representative created after Sarah Foster's resignation. The Board was delighted to receive applications from two good candidates (and also some inquiries from a couple of others who may choose to stand for election in May 2019). At Tuesday night's meeting Andrea Hawkins was appointed to the vacant position. Andrea is a teacher a Hukarare, where she is part of their senior management team. Andrea will bring skills and experience that will benefit the Board and the school.

On property matters, the board received the annual health and safety audit. The safety of the children and the school environment is a high priority for the Board and Tristan tasked with ensuring the relatively small number of identified risks are addressed promptly. Additionally, the school has been allocated approximately \$200,000 to spend on Innovative Learning Spaces. This is additional to the 10-year property budget, role growth classroom funding and money for pre-fab classroom replacement that were mentioned here after the last meeting. The board is working with an architect to come up with a proposal to use this innovative learning space funding that we hope to be able to share with you shortly.

Board meetings are open to the public and so are the minutes from these meetings. If you want to know more about the snippets above or anything else about the Board of Trustees please chat to Tristan or Board Chair, Glen Harkness.
